The Australian ballot was used and the election consumed considerable "previous to the balloting" Mrs. Lovell White of San Francisco addressed the meeting on the national forests and Mrs. Emily Hoppin on the state forests. On the question of suppressing the comic supplement of the Sunday dailies on artistic and for moral grounds the convention was evenly divided. There was a spirited discussion, but no action was taken. **John Mulr, the naturalist and author**, talked to the federation on the mountains of the state and highly praised the beauties of the Hetch-Hetchy valley. The federation adjourned this afternoon after one of the most successful gatherings in its history. The Santa Barbara Woman's club invited the federation to meet next year at Hotel Potter and the invitation was accepted. Mrs. Charles L. Donohue, treasurer, and Mrs. J. C. King, auditor, rendered encouraging reports.

A resolution was adopted condemning San Francisco's attempt to take the water supply of Hetch Hetchy on the ground that it would mar a place of great beauty, whereas there were other places where water could be obtained. The resolution recommended that congress delay action until the matter could be investigated.
